Haiku Festival Chicago

Haiku Festival celebrates children through poetry, while promoting literacy. haiku is a poetic form with Japanese roots. haiku are often about nature, irony, use 3 lines: and 5-7-5 syllables. Most haiku are about nature; senryū are about human nature. Poems, nōtan, and essays are chosen for appeal, originality, technique (images, rhythm, figurative language), mechanics (spelling, grammar, syntax), and format. NB: haiku is singular and plural. Our logo uses two characters: **\$\fambda\$** (actor) + **\$\fambda\$** (poetry).

Wayne Allen Jones, PhD, is founding publisher of fractalEDGEpress and author of 3 poetry books, *The A-Poems, Stone Works*, and *Decades of Rehearsal*. He is a retired educator, psychotherapist, and Haiku Fest Judge.

Alfred Kilinger, MD, was a physician, poet, activist, triathlete; and loyal supporter of Haiku Fest, Jane Addams Hull House, and the human spirit. Al developed a breakfast program that CPS uses as a model.


